A regular meeting of the Pagosa Springs Town Council was called to order on May 19, 2026 at 5:00 PM in the Town Hall 551 Hot Springs Blvd.

Street Supervisor, Branden Lattin, said a solution for the San Juan Alley may not be a speed dip. He suggests a one-way from 8th to 10th as an alternative. He will be hanging door flyers and meeting with the residents, the school, and the library to get their thoughts.

IX. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

1. Ordinance 1027, Second Reading, Adoption of 2024 Model Traffic Code

Ordinance 1027 updates the current version of the 2003 Model Traffic Code ("MTC") to the newest version of the 2024 Model Traffic Code as amended. The subject matter of the MTC relates primarily to comprehensive traffic control regulations for the Town. The purpose of this Ordinance and the Code adopted herein is to provide a system of traffic regulations consistent with state law and generally conforming to similar regulations throughout the state and the nation.

Council Member Bergon moved to approve the second reading of Ordinance 1027, adopting the 2024 Model Traffic Code, as amended, , Council Member Martinez seconded. Motion Passed

2. Ordinance 1028, Second Reading, Adopting a fine, surcharge and point schedule for violation of the model traffic code

Ordinance 1028 piggybacks Ordinance 1027 by updating the Fine, Fee, and Surcharge schedule in support of the adoption of the 2024 Model Traffic Code. The Fine, Fee, and Surcharge Schedule delineates the statutory fines, fees, and surcharges associated with violation of their respective traffic control regulations for the Town. The purpose of this Ordinance and the Code adopted herein is to provide fines, fees, and surcharges for traffic regulations consistent with state law and generally conforming to similar regulations throughout the state and the nation.

Council Member Lindner moved to approve the second reading of Ordinance 1028, adopting the updated Fine, Fee, and Surcharge Schedule, , Council Member deGraaf seconded.
Motion Passed

3. Ordinance 1029, Second Reading, Amending the Municipal Code to Align with Certain Provisions of State Law

Ordinance 1029 provides a stop-gap measure and a starting point for aligning penalty authority with state law. This is in response to the Colorado Supreme Court's decision in *People v. Camp* and *People v. Simons*. It also reflects the recent Town Charter updates authorized by voters on April 7, 2026.

Council Member Lindner moved to approve Ordinance 1029, second reading, amending the Municipal Code to align with certain provisions of State Law, , Council Member Martinez seconded. Motion Passed

4. Letters of Interest to Serve on Town Council

An open at large council seat was created when Matt DeGuise's term ended on April 6, 2026. The Town has advertised for the position without any letters of interest being received. The seat remains open, advertising for the position continues, and will be considered at the June 16th meeting.

The person appointed to this open seat will serve for the next four years until April 2030.

X. NEW BUSINESS

1. Art Call Proposal

Recreation Supervisor, Amanda Gadowski, said the Art Committee Board is recommending artist Mark Rane for the geothermal sculpture in Centennial Park, noting that his submission was the most professional and comprehensive of all the artists reviewed. The board recommended selecting Mr. Rane to create a final rendition that blends the best elements of his initial two proposals.

Council Member Bergon said Amanda Gadowski has done a great job in working with the Art Committee to fulfill their vision.

Council Member deGraaf moved to approve Mark Rane as the artist of choice for the geothermal panel installation at Centennial Park, Council Member Williams seconded.
Motion Passed

2. Shine Gelato OCE Proposal - Scenic Overlook

Senior Planner, Katelyn Tunnell, presented a request for a seasonal Outdoor Commercial Establishment (OCE) permit for a mobile, solar-powered gelato cart at the Town of Pagosa Springs Scenic Overlook. The proposed operation would occur on Town-owned property within the Open Space and Parks zoning district and would operate from a fixed seasonal location within the existing overlook area daily until dark. The applicant has a plan should he be relocated to a different location.

Council Member Bergon said she is sensitive to competition. She said the sandwich board

signs and trash removal need to be addressed. Mayor Pierce said she is also very sensitive to competition, and she suggests a location closer to Town Park. Council Member Lindner said he supports these kinds of businesses, but that Yamaguchi and South Pagosa Park could be alternative locations. Council Member Williams said he likes the vitality this type of business adds to the community. He said mapping out a zone where these types of businesses might be helpful. Council Member Martinez said this is not the right time, and after the reconstruction is over, then these kinds of business ideas may be better timed.

Council Member Martinez moved to deny the Outdoor Commercial Establishment permit for the Shine Gelato cart at the Pagosa Springs Scenic Overlook area at this time, Council Member Lindner seconded. Motion Passed.

3. Appeal Hearing Regarding Neel Plat Amendment Application Approval

Development Director, James Dickhoff, presented the Mountain Vista Townhome Association Board of Director's (Appellant) notice of appeal regarding the Director's approval of the Neel Plat Amendment application, pursuant to Land Use Development Code section 2.4.14.

Mr. Ron Barnum, representing the appellant, presented his appeal considerations for this development plan.

Council Member Lindner said basically the appellant is asking for a major subdivision determination in order to have the developer install amenities like lighting and improvements to Wildwood roadway. Council Member Bergon said her concern is the width of the shared driveway and the improvements to the driveway. Staff clarified the width of the driveway to ten to twelve feet, and the moving of the lot lines is substantial, creating two larger lots. Council Member Williams said he supports the Town's professional staff and the interpretation made by the Planning Commission.

Mayor Pierce said she believes the lot adjustments create four lots and therefore it becomes a major subdivision rather than a minor subdivision.

Council Member Williams moved to affirm the Planning Commission's determination, affirming the Director's decision approving the Neel Plat Amendment application, Council Member deGraaf seconded. Motion Passed

PROJECT: Request for a Permit for Professional Fireworks Display by John "Scott" Neal on or around 141 S 10th Street (Elementary School ballfield) on the evening of Saturday, June 6.

ACTION: Discussion and Action

PURPOSE/BACKGROUND:

John "Scott" Neal owns land at 210 Tenth Street in town across from the Elementary School. He is proposing to have a fireworks show the evening of June 6 between 8:30 and 9 PM as part of an event on his property. He has engaged a professional company, J&M Displays (Claire Skalinski), to utilize the Elementary School ballfields (141 S Tenth St). An application to the Fire District has been made to permit this display and to provide a fire watch. He also reached out to Public Works and Police to close a road and provide security. Town Code prohibits fireworks displays except that it may establish procedures to do so per State Code. The Codes read as follows (emphasis added):

Section 12.11.10 of the municipal code titled "shooting fireworks" states:

- (1) No person shall have in his or her possession use, or explode any fireworks, unless a permit for display has been granted by the Town in accordance with § 12-28-103, C.R.S.
- (2) Fireworks as used herein means any article, device, or substance prepared for the primary purpose of producing a visual or auditory sensation by combustion explosion, deflagration, or detonation.
- (3) The term "fireworks" does not include:
 - (a) Toy caps that do not contain more than twenty-five hundredths (0.0025) of a grain of explosives compound per cap;
 - (b) Highway flares, railway fuses, ship distress signals, smoke candles, and other emergency signal devices;
 - (c) Educational rockets and toy propellant device type engines used in such rockets when such rockets are of nonmetallic construction and utilize replaceable engines or model cartridges containing less than two ounces of propellant and when such engines or model cartridges are designed to be ignited by electrical means; or
 - (d) Fireworks that are used in testing or research by a licensed explosives laboratory.

C.R.S. 12-28-103 has been repealed and replaced with Title 24-33.5-2003 (same language) which reads as follows:

Permits - exceptions to permit requirements

(1) Any governing body has the power to grant nontransferable and nonassignable permits within the area under its jurisdiction for the storage of fireworks or for the facilities used for the retail sales of fireworks, including permissible fireworks, by any person and to adopt reasonable rules for the granting of such permits. The fee for a permit issued pursuant to this subsection (1) shall be limited to what is reasonable and necessary to cover the direct and indirect costs associated with the granting and enforcement of such permits.

(2) Any governing body has the power to grant nontransferable and nonassignable permits within the area under its jurisdiction for displays of fireworks or pyrotechnic special effects performances by any person, fair association, amusement park, or other organizations or groups and to adopt reasonable rules for the granting of such permits.

(3) No permit shall be required for the display of fireworks at the state fair grounds by the board of commissioners of the Colorado state fair authority, at any duly authorized county or district fair, or at any display by any governing body or local authority.

(4) The discharge of fireworks pursuant to a permit provided for in subsection (2) of this section, or as otherwise provided in subsection (3) of this section, shall be lawful in Colorado, if the display or pyrotechnic special effects performance is performed in accordance with the requirements of the national fire protection association as stated in NFPA-1123, code for the outdoor display of fireworks or NFPA-1126, standard for the use of pyrotechnics before a proximate audience.

It is this Manager's understanding that a request has been made of the Fire District for a permit for this proposed event and for a fire watch. It has been verbally represented that the School District has granted authorization of the use of the Elementary School. Based on this Manager's understanding and interpretation of the above codes, the requestor will need to make application for a permit by the Town Council.

While deliberating, Council may wish to consider the following:

1. **Costs:** Requiring the applicant/sponsor to pay all costs connected to the event, including Fire District standby, Police, Public Works, traffic control, notifications, cleanup, and any damage repair.
2. **Insurance:** Require the final certificate of insurance before the permit is issued. The Town, Fire District, property owner/school district, and any other required agencies must be listed as additional insured.
3. **Property Permission:** Since the display is proposed on school property, the Town should require written approval from the School District.
4. **Cancellation Authority:** Council should clearly identify who has the authority to cancel the display due to fire restrictions, wind, dry conditions, red flag warnings, or other safety concerns. The Town Council has granted this authority to the Town Manager who must consult the Fire Chief, Police Chief, and Sheriff before implementation.
5. **Traffic and Pedestrian Plan:** Require a plan showing how vehicles, parking, pedestrians, emergency access, and neighborhood impacts will be managed.
6. **Notification:** Require advance notice to surrounding residents and property owners. I recommend asking Council how far out they want notice sent. This notice should include the date, time, location, noise warnings, pet/livestock concerns, and contact information.
7. **Noise Ordinance:** If the event conflicts with the Town's noise ordinance, we should require the

variance or approval to be completed before the permit is issued.

8. Cleanup: The applicant/sponsor must be responsible for cleaning up all fireworks debris and repairing any damage to Town, school, or private property.

At the time of this writing, Archuleta County Sheriff and Town Manager do not have active Fire Restrictions.

A total of 360 shells will be pre-loaded in mortars built into 36 above ground racks with legs. A total of 17 cakes with a final shot count of 1620 will also be prepared for the display. This brings the total shot count of the show to 1980. Please see attached proposal showing the shell sizes and descriptions.

Mortars are made of fiberglass and meet specifications found in NFPA 1123 Code for Fireworks Display 2018 Edition (A.4.3.7). The racks are constructed according to specifications in NFPA 1123 (A.4.6.1.) For this display all racks will be set up to fire straight up with no racks angled. All shells and cakes will be fired electrically using one igniter per shell/cake. Each shell has its own cue position on the firing board. At least one responsible person will remain at the display set-up location at all times.

The display operator will be given the customer's contact information as part of our standard show packet. Their work phone, cell phone, and email information will be given. The day of the display the operator and customer will be in contact via cell phone.

The use of spotters is standard protocol during the firing of all displays. We will have one person assigned to watch the racks for any misalignment or instability that may occur during the firing of the show. One crew member will be assigned to watch the shells to be sure that every shell explodes in the air. This will help us know if we have any unfired duds to look for after the show. Both spotters will have direct communication with the display operator.

The display shells will be transported in DOT-approved fiberboard boxes, with all appropriate labels for 1.3G fireworks. Shells will remain in shipping containers until loaded into mortars for wiring to the firing module.

Lighting at the firing site will be by flashlight, generator or other battery-operated source. One ABC fire extinguishers and two water extinguishers will be available at the site.

The display will begin between 8:30 PM - 9:00 pm, depending on wind conditions and entertainment plans of the sponsor.

Following the display, a reasonable length of time will elapse before inspections of the tubes begins. Meanwhile, the firing panel will be turned off so that the source of power is removed. The operator will inspect the tubes to be sure all have fired. When sufficient time has elapsed, igniter wiring will be disconnected and any remaining shells carefully removed from the boards and placed in a shipping container to be returned to the supplier.



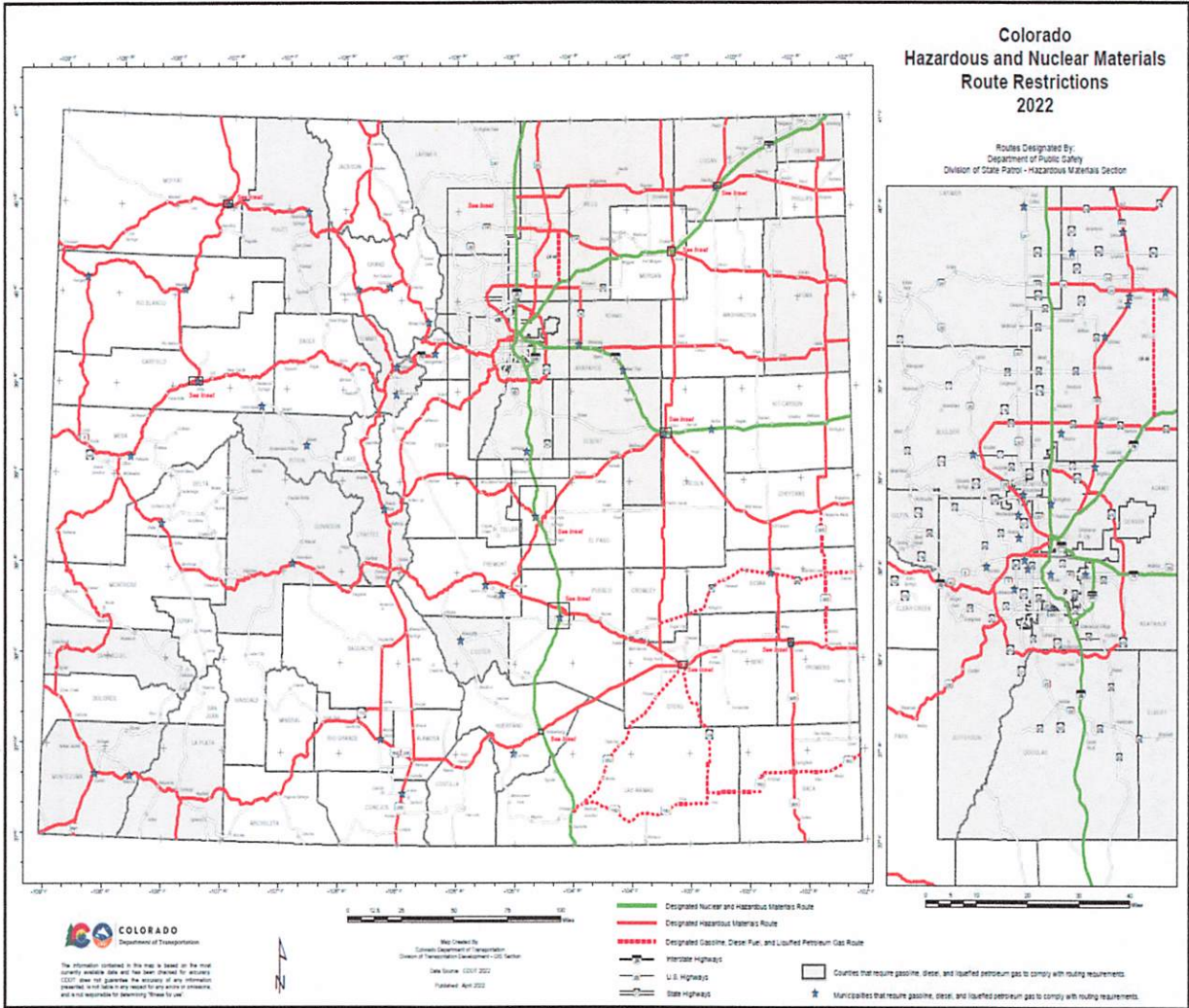

A.4.3.7.1 HDPE mortars (and possibly other types) can lose significant strength if fired repeatedly over a relatively short period of time. Accordingly, when mortars will be reloaded during a display, it is appropriate to consider this potential problem.

A.4.3.9 Where there is concern that a mortar is too short to cause an aerial shell to be propelled to a safe altitude, a test firing should be conducted. However, it generally is believed that mortars of the lengths specified in Table A.4.3.9 are sufficient.

The lengths specified in Table A.4.3.9 are not intended to be construed as absolute minimums; however, experience has demonstrated that these recommendations function reliably in use.

A.4.4.1 The use of securely positioned racks located on barges and trailers can be permitted, provided that all other code requirements are met.

A.4.4.3 Examples of materials for use in providing added support include wood and flat stones.

The above fees are established for licenses, certification and permits issued by the Department of Public Safety. Consult the local authority to determine their fees for permits, if any, pursuant to C.R.S. 24-33.5- 2003. Of the above fees, the sum of \$50.00 represents the cost to process applications for licensing or certification. In the event an application for licensing or certification is denied, for any reason, this amount is non-refundable. Processing fees will not be refunded in the event that local or statewide fireworks restrictions are enacted. In addition, the above listed fees are non-refundable in the event a license is suspended or revoked. Fees may be waived or modified when appropriate at the discretion of the Director or his designee. Request for waiver or modification shall be in writing.

Payment of the fee required by these rules and regulations must accompany the application for certification to the Division. Certification issued under these rules and regulations shall be dated and numbered and shall be valid for a period of three years unless earlier revoked. In the event

that an application for a fireworks certification is incomplete, the applicant shall have 180 days in which to submit additional required documentation, after which the initial application shall be void. Processing fees in accordance with 14.1 shall be forfeited. Renewal of the certification shall be granted to an operator without the need to retest, provided: (a) they are in good standing with the Division; and (b) they have actively participated in at least three fireworks displays during the previous three-year period.

A General Knowledge Fireworks Examination designed to indicate that personnel who handle display fireworks in the State of Colorado have a minimum understanding of safety requirements and State regulations, shall be administered to all persons who apply for certification as an operator of pyrotechnic displays. This examination shall be developed or approved by the Director. Length and content of the examination and the passing grade will be at the discretion of the Director. Any person may retake the examination when a passing grade is not achieved; however, a waiting period of thirty (30) days is required after each unsuccessful attempt. Applicants may receive three successive examination attempts. Should the applicant fail the examination on the third attempt, he will not be allowed to retake the examination until he produces evidence of satisfactory completion of an approved program of instruction in conducting fireworks displays. A company or corporation which utilizes a training and testing program to qualify their personnel may petition the Division to use this test in lieu of this General
