PURPOSE/BACKGROUND:

Highlights

- Cone Zone Care remains in active season mode, with continued focus on reducing confusion, supporting access, and keeping downtown businesses visible during construction.
- Eight directional banners were designed and purchased to help facilitate navigation around the Hot Springs Boulevard closure, scheduled from June 3 to June 18.
- CDOT has provided a pedestrian walking and parking access map for the Hot Springs Boulevard and Overlook parking lot closure area, which is expected to remain useful through June 19. Cone Zone Care will help distribute this map and related closure information through Main Street channels.
- CDOT PIO coordination continues, including a June 3 check-in with Meredith Greene regarding current communication needs, business feedback, Lewis Street questions, and overall project timing.
- The Business Assistance Grant Fund remains in the final verification and follow-up phase, with targeted Impact Zone storefront verification and final outreach planned for the next few weeks.
- The broader business contact update and directory work will continue as a separate, ongoing project rather than delaying fund distribution.
- The DOLA-supported communications plan deliverables from Blakely+Company have been completed and will be shared with the board for review, with detailed discussion and implementation decisions deferred to a future meeting. Main Street received a \$3,000 DOLA scholarship award, with no match required, to support program education and professional development.
- Pagosa Springs Main Street was included in the Colorado Main Street Program's statewide

announcement recognizing communities receiving National Main Street designation for 2026.

- A more formal volunteer program is becoming an important next step for Main Street sustainability, continued results, and future progress toward the Excelling level of Main Street accreditation.

Cone Zone Care and Construction Support

Cone Zone Care remains focused on practical “reduce confusion” wayfinding and communication support during the active construction season. Recent work included designing and purchasing eight directional banners to help facilitate navigation around the Hot Springs Boulevard closure, which is scheduled from June 3 to June 18. During this closure, the Overlook parking lot is also closed, and Hermosa Street is closed at Hot Springs Boulevard due to electrical and concrete work on the road past that intersection. The goal remains to complete the required work in time for the July 4 holiday and parade.

CDOT PIO Meredith Greene has now provided a pedestrian walking and parking access map for the Hot Springs Boulevard and Overlook parking lot closure area. The map is expected to be useful through the end of next week, June 19, and shows the Hot Springs Boulevard roadway closure from Pagosa Street to the river bridge, with alternating sidewalk segments available for pedestrian access. It also identifies available parking areas and directs pedestrians to use Pagosa Street, the River Walk, and San Juan Street to access available Hot Springs Boulevard sidewalks. Cone Zone Care will help distribute the map and related closure information through Main Street communication channels.

I met with Meredith on June 3 to review current construction communication, business feedback, and common public questions. Meredith remains in consistent contact with many downtown businesses and reports that businesses are generally rolling with the schedule, staying engaged, and paying attention to updates shared through CDOT, Main Street, Town, County, Chamber, and Tourism communication channels.

The two questions I hear most often are when the Lewis Street intersection will be finished and reopened, and whether the overall project is still on track for completion. Lewis Street remains one of the more complicated work areas due to geothermal surprises and overlapping utility work involving geothermal, water, sewer, stormwater, electric, and fiber. The project team is currently working seven days a week and expects to have a better sense of the Lewis Street timeline in the next couple of weeks. At this time, the overall project remains on track to be completed by the end of the year.

Business Assistance Grant Fund

The Business Assistance Grant Fund remains in the final verification and follow-up phase. Last year, Main Street raised \$13,408.62 for the fund through a generous donation from The Springs Resort & Spa and proceeds from the Wednesday Wine Walks. The funds have been held in a restricted account while we developed and launched a board-approved distribution approach for eligible Impact Zone storefront businesses.

At the May Main Street Advisory Board meeting, the board directed me to separate the fund closeout from the broader district-wide business contact update. The fund will move forward with a focused

final call campaign for eligible Impact Zone storefront businesses, while the broader business contact update and directory work will continue as an ongoing project.

Capacity has been tight during the Art Walk marketing launch, so the Business Assistance Grant Fund follow-up will resume in the next few weeks.

Communications Plan

Through DOLA-supported technical assistance, Blakely+Company completed the Pagosa Springs Main Street communications plan deliverables based on our March 16 workshop and follow-up input and review meetings. We held a debrief meeting on June 3 to review the final package.

The final deliverables include a communications plan, key messages one-pager, fact sheet, website evaluation and recommendations, media training guide, press kit, and templates for presentations, newsletters, social media, and posters. These deliverables provide a strong foundation for consistent messaging, clearer role definition, improved partner coordination, and repeatable communication tools that are realistic to implement with limited capacity.

Given the immediate deadlines for Art Walk, Color Pagosa's Past, and the Business Assistance Grant Fund, I recommend deferring detailed discussion and implementation decisions on the communications plan to a future meeting. I will send a link to the documents and instructions in a separate email for board review.

Colorado/National Main Street Recognition + DOLA Scholarship Support

The Colorado Main Street Program issued a statewide announcement recognizing communities receiving National Main Street designation for 2026, including Pagosa Springs Main Street. This recognition underscores the strength and credibility of the Main Street model and reinforces the value of our accreditation, both in results and in access to statewide resources and technical support.

Last week, we received a DOLA award letter for \$3,000 in scholarship funding, with no match required, to support program education and training. This scholarship funding enables me to participate in Main Street conferences and professional development tied to the proven Main Street Approach/Four Point Approach, strengthening my skills as a Main Street Manager and improving our ability to implement effectively at the local level. DOLA notes this award may be amended over time to add additional scholarship funds and potential mini-grants, creating an ongoing opportunity to leverage every dollar and deliver measurable results for downtown and the community.

Formal Volunteer Program

As Main Street's work continues, a more formal volunteer program is becoming increasingly important. We have made significant progress with construction support, events, communications, heritage projects, business outreach, and post-construction planning, and a clearer volunteer structure would make that work more sustainable over time. Defined roles, simple systems, and broader shared participation would help us continue producing strong results while creating more opportunities for board members and community volunteers to contribute in manageable, meaningful ways.

A formal volunteer program is also an important step as we work toward future progress within the Main Street accreditation framework, including the possibility of moving from Achieving to Excelling. To continue producing results at this level, and to grow in a realistic way, we need a stronger structure for

recruiting, assigning, supporting, and tracking volunteers.

The immediate focus remains on delivering current priorities, including the June 26 Art Walk, Color Pagosa's Past, and the Business Assistance Grant Fund closeout. At the same time, these projects highlight why a more intentional volunteer structure will be important going forward. Once the most time-sensitive items are completed, we can begin developing a practical volunteer framework that supports future downtown events, Heritage & Culture projects, business outreach, and other Main Street priorities without creating unnecessary complexity.

Dear Mayor Pierce,

As you may know, the Main Street program is designed to support local empowerment and the revitalization of central business districts by leveraging each community's unique architecture, character, and local ownership. The mission of the Colorado Main Street Program is to strengthen communities in Colorado by assisting them in implementing the Main Street Approach and helping to revitalize and preserve historic downtown areas through preservation-based economic development and community-led initiatives.

Being part of a Main Street Community offers numerous benefits. As an Achieving Community in the program, the Town of Pagosa Springs receives mini-grants and scholarship funds.

This current award provides a scholarship designed to help local program staff and volunteers expand their knowledge of the Main Street Approach. **The total grant award at this time is \$3,000 in scholarship funding, which does not require a match.** These funds will be accessible once the grant contract is fully executed; however, the award requires that Pagosa Springs remain a Main Street Achieving Community in good standing for the duration of the contract. As funding becomes available over the next five years, the state may amend this award to add scholarship funds and mini-grants (mini-grants require a 25% match).

This grant offer is made from federal mineral lease proceeds.

Please contact Gayle Langley, Main Street Coordinator, at 720-498-0563 for information on how to proceed. As a reminder, no state funds can be obligated until the grant contract is fully executed. Any expenditures made prior to this cannot be included in the contract budget and will not be reimbursed by the state. Consult with Gayle before spending any funds. According to our program guidelines, this offer is valid until June 30, 2030.

PURPOSE/BACKGROUND:

The Main Street Art Walk is now in final rollout mode for the June 26 and July 24 event dates. Artist and business recruitment is complete, pairings are finalized, and the event structure has been organized around three distinct experience areas: a West End Art Hub in the heart of the shopping district, a Mid-Main Art Hub featuring an interactive community mural project at Picasso & Vino, and an East End Lounge at RiverWalk Inn featuring local artists and artisan chocolate tasting.

Board Member Rosanna Dufour and I have been promoting the Art Walk through Main Street channels and coordinating directly with participating businesses and artists. On June 8, we sent the full media kit to all participating businesses and artists, including social media graphics and templates, artist spotlight templates, email marketing templates, suggested posts and hashtags, event information, key messaging, logos, and branding assets. The full promotional blitz launched June 9 through Main Street social media, email marketing, community calendars, media outreach, partner organizations, and participant amplification.

Participating businesses and artists have been encouraged to promote their own artwork, locations, specials, demonstrations, activities, refreshments, discounts, giveaways, and other unique offerings. Main Street will continue promoting the Art Walk as a district-wide experience, while participant promotion will help give visitors more reasons to explore each stop. Participants have also been asked to accept Facebook co-host invitations, invite their own followers and customers, and add details about their specific Art Walk activities to the Facebook event discussion so the event page can function as a living guide to what is happening throughout downtown that evening.

Hard copy maps and posters will be delivered this week. Suction-cup window flags will be distributed to each participating business location during the week of the event so visitors can easily identify Art Walk stops. Main Street also purchased three large 10-foot sail flags and twenty suction-cup window flags using Tourism event support funding. The larger flags will help create a visible event presence and identify key hub areas, while the suction-cup flags will mark participating storefronts. These signs were intentionally designed as evergreen Main Street event signage so they can be reused for future Art Walks, Wine Walks, holiday events, festivals, and other downtown activations.

The businesses and artists will lead their own in-location activities, but because this is a first-year event,

Main Street should expect questions, wayfinding needs, and on-the-ground coordination. Board member support is especially needed at the two true event hubs: Picasso & Vino and RiverWalk Inn. The 400 Block will function more as a strong cluster of participating stops, but it would still be helpful to have board members present as visible Main Street ambassadors who can linger, answer questions, encourage movement through the district, and support participating businesses and artists.

Board members are asked to sign up for June 26 Art Walk support assignments before leaving the meeting, if available. Priority needs include support at Picasso & Vino, support at the RiverWalk Inn East End Lounge, and ambassador/roving support in the 400 Block. Helpful roles may include greeting attendees, answering basic questions, pointing people to maps and participating stops, encouraging visitors to continue exploring the district, helping troubleshoot minor needs, and serving as a visible Main Street presence. A simple identifier such as a Main Street badge, sticker, lanyard, or other marker would help attendees and participants know who can answer questions.

A special thank-you goes to Board Member Rosanna Dufour, who has put an extraordinary amount of time, creativity, and energy into helping build this event. Rosanna and I are working closely together on maps, marketing materials, artist and business communication, participant support, and event logistics.

PURPOSE/BACKGROUND:

The Heritage & Culture Committee continues advancing Colorado 150/America 250 projects that connect history, community identity, and downtown vitality.

For *Color Pagosa's Past*, the initial Call for Artists produced fewer usable submissions than needed for the full 28-page coloring book, so the committee adjusted the process to keep the project moving while still protecting quality and community relevance. During our last committee meeting, we discussed different approaches and agreed upon a simplified, community-created format using assigned subjects tied to Pagosa Springs and Archuleta County history, heritage, landscapes, wildlife, and sense of place. The committee had originally identified about 30 possible subjects, and we expanded that list to about 40 so we can select the strongest 28 pages for the final book. I also created hard-copy contributor packets with assigned subjects, simple instructions, a drawing template, and the Town permission form.

Because the timeline is tight, board member participation is now needed and appreciated! We invite you to put on your artist hat and take one contributor packet to complete one coloring book page. The goal is expressive, meaningful, community-created line art that helps tell Pagosa's story in a way people of all ages can enjoy. Main Street is known for adding layers of fun, and this is a great way to bring that spirit into the project, generate some creativity, and perhaps even spark a little friendly competition.

Planning also continues for the history-themed scavenger hunt through the Visit Pagosa app. I met with Tourism on May 28 to discuss app specifics, and we hope to launch at the end of the month and continue throughout the year, or longer if participation data shows ongoing interest. The hunt will focus on downtown stops and is designed to be fun for families, interesting for history buffs, and easy for residents and visitors to enjoy at their own pace. The goal is to make local history more visible and interactive while encouraging people to explore the Main Street district. Participants who complete 8 of the 12 stops can visit the Visitor Center to spin the prize wheel. Main Street will contribute downtown business gift cards as prizes, continuing our mission to support downtown vitality and drive foot traffic to local businesses.

Work also continues on the History Vault, including planning for the Colorado Day "Seal the Vault" event on August 1. The vault project is intended to collect and preserve community stories, memories,

and materials connected to Pagosa's past and present as part of the Colorado 150/America 250 commemoration.

Given the near-term deadlines, the current priority is to launch the downtown history scavenger hunt and complete the coloring book project. Once those are moving, the committee can shift more attention back to cataloging, organizing, and publishing the oral history materials. Oral history work remains an important part of the overall effort, with 30+ hours recorded and Aztec Media engaged for professional editing and time-coded transcription.

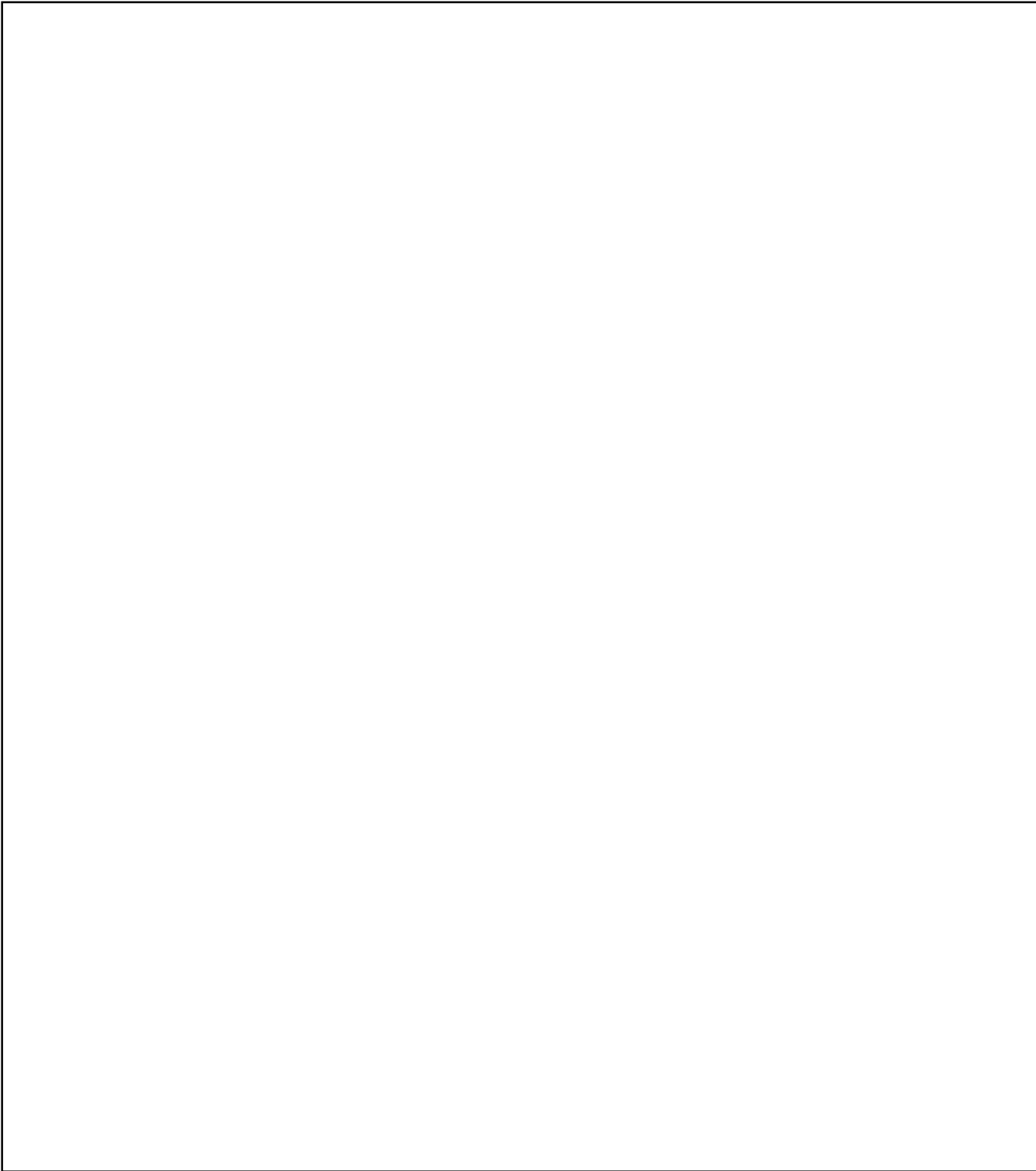

I, _____, ("Participant") hereby grant permission to the Town of Pagosa Springs (hereafter referred to as "the Town") through the **Pagosa Springs Community Development Corporation** to use my Work according to the terms and conditions below.

Purpose. The Town, by and through the Pagosa Springs Community Development Corporation, has requested members of the public submit artwork (the "Work") for inclusion in **Color Pagosa's Past: A Colorado 150 Commemorative Coloring Book, a community publication planned for free distribution beginning August 2026** (the "Project"). The Town intends to make the Project available and accessible to the general public, including, but not limited to the Project. Participant has voluntarily offered the Work to further the Project. The Town may use the Participant's name, display name, and brief bio for credits and Project-related promotion. The Town will credit Participant in the Project and may credit Participant in promotional materials when practical. Credit placement and format will be determined by layout and design needs.

Usage. The Work may be used, printed, reproduced, distributed, and displayed for educational, scholarly, and historical purposes in any media format (including but not limited to print, digital, and electronic) by the Town. The Work may be archived and stored as part of the Town's collections, and made accessible to researchers, scholars, and the general public. The Town may use the Work for promotion, publicity, reporting, education, and archival purposes related to the Project (including press releases and grant reporting), the Town and future projects. The Work may be used in future reprints and later editions of the Project, and other projects. The term "Work" shall mean and include all or a portion of the original artwork including any edits, whether published in full or in part. The Town may make minor production adjustments needed for print and layout, such as resizing, cropping, minor cleanup, converting file formats, and adjusting contrast or line weight. Participant grants to the Town the copyright and the right to enforce such copyright to the Work including the right to develop derivative materials prepared from Work and copyright the derivative materials.

Ownership. The Town shall have a perpetual, non-exclusive right to use the Work for the purposes stated above. I understand and acknowledge that the Town shall make the Work freely available to the general public, including but not limited to the Project, and that a third-party may obtain the Work and use the Work for its own purposes. The

Town is not obligated to publish the Work or make the Work available, nor to preserve, maintain or otherwise store the Work.

Release. Participant hereby waives, releases, and discharges the Town, its agents, employees, representatives, successors, and assigns, from any and all claims, demands, actions, causes of action, or liabilities of any kind or nature whatsoever, whether known or unknown, arising out of or in any way connected with the Work.

Removal from Public Access. The participant may request the removal of their Work from public access at any time. Such a request must be made in writing to Town of Pagosa Springs Town Manager, PO Box 1859, Pagosa Springs, CO 81147, and the Town Manager will make reasonable efforts to remove the Work from publicly accessible platforms within 90 business days. However, the Town of Pagosa Springs cannot guarantee the removal of any copies or derivatives that may have been accessed or used by third parties prior to the request.

Limitation on Town Indemnity. Nothing in this agreement shall obligate the Town to indemnify, defend, or hold harmless Participant. The Town is relying on and does not waive or intend to waive by any provision of this agreement, the monetary limitations or any other rights, immunities, defenses, and protections provided by the Colorado Governmental Immunity Act, § 24-10-101, *et seq.*, C.R.S., as from time to time amended, or otherwise available to the Town or its officers or employees. Under no circumstances shall the Town be liable to Participant for any damages, including but not limited to special, punitive, indirect or consequential damages suffered by the Participant arising out of or in connection with the Work including, without limitation, lost profits, loss of use, or loss of opportunity.

Governing Law and Venue. The laws of the State of Colorado, without regard to Colorado laws regarding conflicts of law, shall govern the construction, interpretation, execution and enforcement of this agreement. Venue for any dispute arising out of or relating to the Agreement shall be in the State of Colorado District Court for Archuleta County.

Confidentiality. Notwithstanding any other provision contained in this agreement, the Town shall have no obligation to keep and maintain in confidence any document, including this agreement, that is subject to disclosure under the Colorado Open Records Act, Part 2, Article 72, Title 24, C.R.S., as determined by the Town.

PURPOSE/BACKGROUND:

Purpose

This item is included to review current Main Street Advisory Board membership, note upcoming at-large term expirations, confirm the reappointment process, and discuss whether the Board would like to bring forward a proposed bylaw cleanup at the next meeting.

Background

The Pagosa Springs Main Street Advisory Board Bylaws provide that the Board shall consist of a minimum of seven (7) members and a maximum of fifteen (15) total members. Members are recommended by the Board and appointed by Town Council. The Bylaws also state that board members may succeed themselves as many times as they are re-elected and re-appointed by Town Council, and that board members must be residents of Colorado.

The Bylaws identify ex officio representation from the Town of Pagosa Springs and the Pagosa Springs Community Development Corporation Board of Directors. The Bylaws also allow additional representatives from other agencies and organizations to be added to lend expertise, with ex officio terms concluding with the term of the corresponding Town or Board positions.

The current County/BOCC representative and Visit Pagosa representative seats were added by prior Board action and fall under this "additional representatives" provision. While those seats are valid under the current Bylaws, they are not specifically named in the Bylaws. The Board may wish to consider a future cleanup amendment to clearly identify the County/BOCC and Visit Pagosa seats as standing ex officio/additional representative positions.

Bylaw amendments may be adopted by a majority vote of the Board at any regular or special meeting, with final approval from Town Council.

Current Board Membership

Current board membership is as follows:

- Warren Brown, Ex Officio, term concurrent with office/designation — County Representative
- Rosanna Dufour, At-Large, term expires July 2028
- Darren Gantt, At-Large, term expires July 2026
- Mario Garcia, Ex Officio, term concurrent with office/designation — PSCDC Board Representative
- Jennifer Green, Ex Officio, term concurrent with office/designation — Visit Pagosa Representative
- Rick Holter, At-Large, term expires July 2028
- Jeremy Martin, At-Large, term expires July 2028
- Shari Pierce, Ex Officio, term concurrent with office/designation — Town Council Representative
- Barbara Swindlehurst, At-Large, term expires July 2028
- Santos Luis O’Canas, At-Large, term expires July 2026

The Board currently has ten (10) members, which is within the Bylaws requirement of a minimum of seven (7) and a maximum of fifteen (15) members.

Upcoming Term Expirations

Two at-large board member terms expire in July 2026:

- Darren Gantt
- Santos Luis O’Canas

Both members are eligible to continue serving if they wish to do so. The Board should confirm whether each member is interested in continuing for another term. If either member would like time to consider the decision, they may communicate their interest to the Main Street Coordinator after the meeting so the appropriate reappointment or recruitment item can be prepared for follow-up.

Formal Reappointment Process

If both eligible members confirm they wish to continue serving, the formal process is:

1. The Board votes to recommend reappointment of the eligible at-large members for a new term.
2. The recommendation is forwarded to Town Council for final approval.
3. Once approved by Town Council, the members continue serving under the new term.
4. The Board roster is updated to reflect the new term expiration dates.

If one or both members do not wish to continue, the Board may direct Coordinator Kat McFadden to begin recruitment for the open at-large seat or seats. Any new appointment would also require Board recommendation and Town Council approval.

Ex Officio / Additional Representative Clarification

The current ex officio/additional representative seats include the Town Council representative, PSCDC Board representative, County/BOCC representative, and Visit Pagosa representative.

The Town Council and PSCDC Board seats are specifically identified in the Bylaws. The County/BOCC and Visit Pagosa seats were added by prior Board action under the Bylaws provision allowing additional representatives from other agencies and organizations to lend expertise.

Because those seats are now functioning as standing representative seats and support coordination across local government, tourism, economic development, and downtown business support, the Board may wish to consider a bylaw cleanup amendment. A proposed update could be brought back at the next meeting to more clearly name these standing ex officio/additional representative positions.

Discussion Items

The Board may wish to discuss:

- Whether Darren Gantt and Santos Luis O’Canas wish to continue serving for another term.
- Whether the Board is ready to recommend reappointment of one or both members to Town Council.
- Whether recruitment is needed if either member does not wish to continue.
- Whether the Board would like staff to prepare a proposed bylaw cleanup amendment for the next meeting to specifically identify the County/BOCC and Visit Pagosa representative seats.
- Whether any other membership, term, or representative-seat clarifications should be reviewed as part of a future bylaw cleanup.

Recommendation

Confirm interest from the two at-large members with terms expiring in July 2026 and provide direction on reappointment or recruitment next steps. Separately, provide direction on whether to bring back a proposed bylaw cleanup amendment at the next meeting to specifically identify the County/BOCC and Visit Pagosa representative seats.

Recommended Action — Reappointment, if both members confirm interest

Move to recommend reappointment of Darren Gantt and Santos Luis O’Canas to the Main Street Advisory Board for new at-large terms, subject to final approval by Town Council.

Recommended Action — If one or both members need additional time

Move to direct the Main Street Coordinator to confirm interest from at-large board members with terms expiring in July 2026 and bring back reappointment recommendations or recruitment next steps for Board consideration.

Optional Additional Direction — Bylaw Cleanup

Move to direct the Main Street Coordinator to prepare a proposed bylaw cleanup amendment for Board consideration at the next meeting, including language to specifically identify the County/BOCC and Visit Pagosa representative seats as standing ex officio/additional representative positions.

Bylaws of the Pagosa Springs Main Street Advisory Board

Adopted March 2023

Article 1: Main Street Program and Advisory Board

Pagosa Springs Town Council established the Main Street Program on behalf of the Town of Pagosa Springs. The Main Street Program is a non-membership, nonprofit program, hereafter referred to as "Program." In July 2022, Town Council appointed the Main Street Advisory Board. The Bylaws contained herein provide the general rules and operating procedures for the Main Street Advisory Board, hereafter referred to as the "Board." These Bylaws shall become effective upon the adoption thereof by a majority vote of the Board and final approval by the Town Council.

Article 2: Mission and Vision Statements

Section 1. Mission Statement. The Board drafted and adopted the following mission statement for the Program:

To ignite a Main Street spirit in Pagosa Springs by being a catalyst for

- Movement on foot, wheels, and water
- Connection of people and places
- Creation of memorable experiences

for folks who work, live, and play here.

Section 2. Vision Statement. The Board drafted and adopted the following vision statement for the Program:

A welcoming Main Street that connects community, commerce, heritage, and the nature that surrounds us.

Article 3: Purposes and Administration

Section 1. Purposes. The purpose of the Board is to promote the historic preservation, protection, and use of Pagosa Springs' traditional downtown area (as delineated in Article 5 herein), including its commercial and civic enterprises and residences, and more specifically:

- a) To improve and revitalize the physical and economic condition of Pagosa Springs' downtown area, thereby promoting the town's historic preservation while contributing to its health and overall community betterment;
- b) To disseminate information on and promote interest in the preservation, history, culture, architecture, recreation, and public use of Pagosa Springs' downtown area;
- c) To hold meetings, seminars, and other activities, including but not limited to, building rehabilitation and design, economic restructuring, and planning that foster the preservation of Pagosa Springs' downtown area and enhance the understanding and appreciation of its history, culture, and architecture; and
- d) To collaborate and partner with other organizations, individuals, and public and private entities located within and outside the Pagosa Springs area that are engaged in similar purposes.

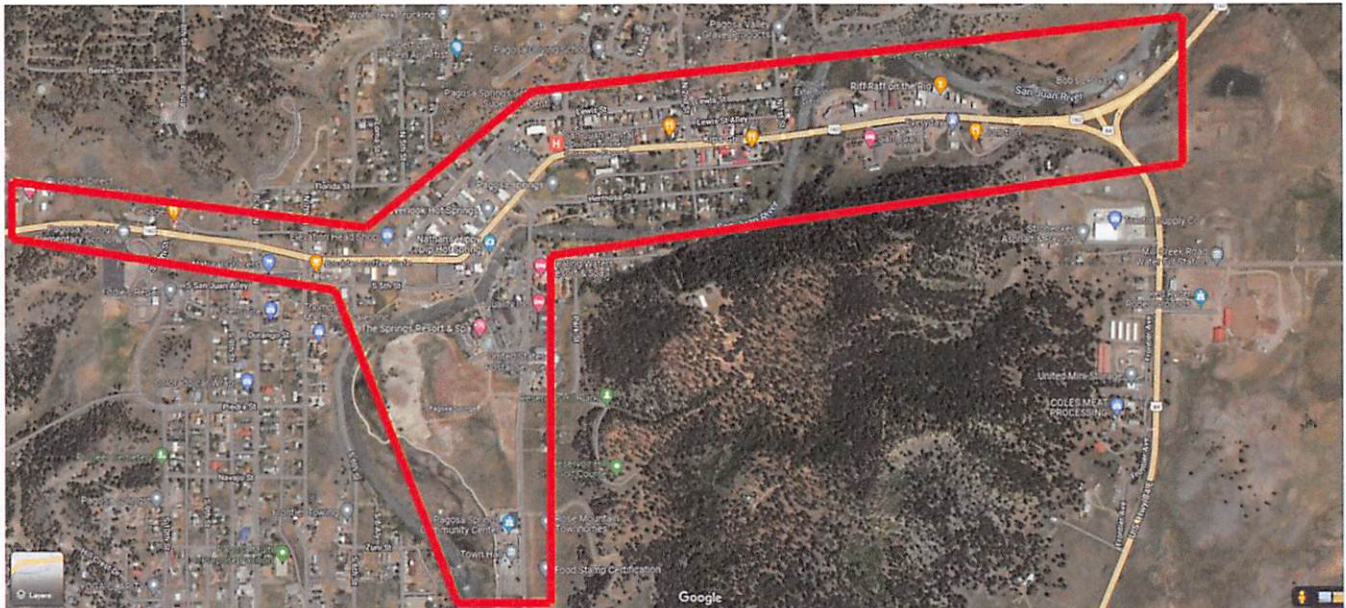
Section 2. Dissolution and Distribution of Assets. The Program can be dissolved either by 1.) a majority vote of the Board with final approval from Town Council or 2.) a majority vote of Town Council. No part of the net assets or net earnings of the Program shall inure to the benefit of, or be paid or distributed to, a Board Member, Officer, or donor of the Program, except that the Program shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes of this Program.

Article 4: Program Office

The registered office, principal office, and principal agent of the Program shall be located at the physical address of 46 Eaton Drive, Suite 4, Pagosa Springs, Colorado 81147. The mailing address shall be PO Box 1183, Pagosa Springs, Colorado 81147. The registered agent at the registered office of the corporation shall be the Main Street Coordinator of the Program. Such Program office information may be amended without a formal resolution of the Board.

Article 5: Program Geographic Area

The Program shall encompass the geographical area indicated on the following map, as such map may be amended by a resolution of the Board with final approval from Town Council:



Article 6: Powers of the Board

Section 1. General Powers. The Board shall have the power to create a robust Program that is approved by Town Council and to oversee generally the implementation of the Program. Without prejudice to such general powers and subject to these Bylaws, the Board shall have the following powers:

- a) To undertake, either alone or in cooperation with others, any lawful activity that may be necessary or desirable in the furtherance of any or all purposes for which the Program is organized, and specifically, but without limitation, to conduct, manage, and establish general policies concerning the affairs and business of the Program; and
- b) To select and remove the Officers of this Board, to prescribe such powers and duties for them as may not be inconsistent with these Bylaws.

Section 2. Number, Tenure, and Qualifications. The Board shall consist of a minimum of seven (7) members and a maximum of fifteen (15) total members. Members shall be recommended by the Board with the appointment by Town Council.

- a) Initial Board term shall commence July 1, 2022, and end June 30, 2024. The term of freely appointed members shall be two (2) or three (3) years or until the Board election of Officers and Town Council appointment of such members' successors.
- b) The Board shall at all times include the following ex officio members as identified by Town Council:
 - i. One (1) representative from the Town of Pagosa Springs and one (1) representative from the Pagosa Springs Community Development Corporation Board of Directors. Additional representatives from other agencies and organizations may be added to lend expertise. Ex officio member terms shall conclude with the term of their corresponding Town or Board positions.
 - ii. A minimum of three (3) business owners or property owners in the Program geographic area (see Article 5).
- c) Three (3) of the Board members shall serve as Officers of the Board: Chair, Vice Chair, and Secretary/Treasurer.
- d) Board members may succeed themselves as many times as they are re-elected and re-appointed by Town Council. Board members must be residents of Colorado.

Section 3. Regular Meetings. A regular monthly meeting of the Board may be held with a minimum 24-hour notice to the public by posting on the Town of Pagosa Springs website

(<https://pagosasprings.civicweb.net/Portal/MeetingTypeList.aspx>). All meetings will adhere to the Colorado Open Meetings Law and be held at the Pagosa Springs Visitor Center meeting room or another location and at a time designated by the Board. The Board may provide, by resolution, the time and place for holding additional regular meetings. Additional regular meetings will adhere to the Colorado Open Meetings Law and shall be held at the same location in the absence of any other designation in the resolution. The Board may also meet in closed Executive Session as allowed by the Colorado Open Meetings Law. The Board Chair may, at their discretion, allow a non-voting Board member or other individual to attend such a Session.

Section 4. *Special Meetings.* Special meetings of the Board may be called by or at the request of the Chair or Vice Chair or by any three (3) or more Board members and shall be held in the location(s) noted in Section 3 above. All special meetings shall adhere to the Colorado Open Meetings Law and be held with a minimum 24-hour notice to the public by posting on the Town of Pagosa Springs website (as noted in Section 3).

Section 5. *Attendance:* Regular attendance is required for all scheduled meetings. Board members may occasionally miss meetings due to circumstances such as, but not limited to, job responsibilities, illness, travel schedules, or holidays. These will generally be considered "excused" absences. In all cases, Board members are expected to notify the Main Street Coordinator of any absences in writing in advance or within three (3) business days of the absence. All meeting minutes shall include roll call and attendance, noting excused/unexcused absences. Unexcused absences shall not exceed more than three (3) per year for scheduled meetings. Any Board member with three (3) unexcused absences will be removed from the Board upon a majority vote of the Board at a regular or special meeting.

Section 6. *Quorum:* A majority of the Board members by these Bylaws shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 7. *Vacancies.* Any vacancy occurring on the Board will be filled by a majority vote of the remaining Board and approved by Town Council. Board members elected to fill a vacancy shall fulfill the unexpired terms of their predecessors.

Section 8. *Rules.* The Board shall conduct business according to Colorado Open Meetings Law.

Article 7: Officers

Section 1. *Number.* The Officers of the Board shall be a Chair, Vice Chair, and Secretary/Treasurer, each of whom must be a Board member and shall be elected by a majority vote of the Board. The Chair shall preside at all Board meetings. The Vice Chair shall be the assistant to the Chair and shall preside in the absence of the Chair. The Secretary/Treasurer shall record and maintain in good order minutes of all meetings and work with the Main Street Coordinator to maintain in good order and report all financial records of the Program.

Section 2. *Election and Term of Office.* The Officers of the Board shall be elected annually at the first meeting in the new year. Each Officer shall assume office upon election and shall hold office until their successor has been duly elected or until their resignation.

Section 3. *Vacancies.* Any vacancy of an Officer may be filled by a majority vote of the Board.

Article 8: Main Street Coordinator

The Main Street Coordinator shall take direction from the Board and shall manage the daily operations of the Program. The Coordinator shall be responsible for coordinating the implementation of the Program's policies and projects, to include grant/"pass-through" funding solicitation and administration, and such other duties as the Board may require. The Coordinator shall attend all Board meetings as a non-voting participant, unless the Board determines otherwise by formal resolution.

Article 9: Funding Sources

Section 1. *Fundraising.* The Board will participate in any public fundraising activities for the Program. Board members may accept any donations and gifts on behalf of the Program and deliver to Coordinator as soon as feasibly possible. All donations, gifts, and raised funds shall be disclosed in the next immediate Board meeting and documented in the meeting minutes.

Section 2. Budget. The Board shall approve a guidance budget for the Program for each fiscal year. The Coordinator will provide the Board with the current status of the budget and expenditures to date at least once a month.

Article 10: Fiscal Year.

Section 1. Duration. The fiscal year of the Program shall be the calendar year.

Section 2. Reports. Each January, the Board will set a new budget for the fiscal year, and the Coordinator will provide a financial report for the previous year.

Article 11: Amendments

These Bylaws may be altered, amended, or repealed, and new Bylaws may be adopted, by a majority vote of the Board at any regular or special meeting and final approval from Town Council.

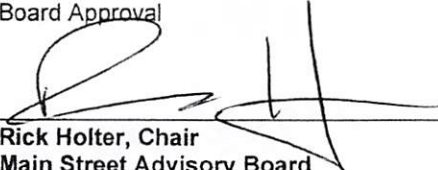
Article 12: Non-Discrimination

No person shall be denied membership on the Board, or be denied admission to or participation in any event promoted or sponsored in whole or in part by the Program, because of their sex, race, religion, gender, sexual orientation, age, or ethnic heritage.

Article 13: Conflict of Interest

All Board members shall disclose at all times any and all conflicts of interest. If any Board member has a material financial interest in, is employed by, or has a close family member in a position of power over an entity associated with any formal agreement being discussed or voted upon, that Board member shall disclose such conflict of interest to the Board and recuse themselves from all decision-making.
